Preserved specimens will be available for inspection, and live animals for those who just have to touch. The talk will include rescue procedures for injured reptiles as well as first aid for snake bite.

In advance of the REPS AGM (on Friday 10<sup>th</sup> November) office bearers' reports for 2006 are published in this volume of Eucryphia.

### President's Report 2006 by Leon Hall, REPS President

It has been a challenging year for REPS with representation at the Australian Landcare Awards and water issues both local and regional.

The International Landcare Conference, held in Melbourne, included the National Landcare Awards with state nominees coming from all over the country (REPS NSW Landcare winner, Bushcare - Nature Conservation 2005). REPS was represented by Sandy Morse and I on the day and I feel we came a close second but had stiff competition with an excellent project by Birds Australia with the Glue Pot Reserve (see article in newsletter).

More close to home REPS are involved with Sydney Water water issues and the NSW Governments (Sydney Catchment Authority -SCA ) plans to modify their water supply. We have made submissions about the; Kangaloon Borefields Proposal, the Shoalhaven Transfers proposal, the draft Special Areas Strategic Plan of Management (2006) and the draft Wingecarribee Swamp and Special Area Plan of Management (2006). Recently REPS has shown their concern regarding earth work affecting Caalang Creek.

Both Caalang Creek reserve and Pinkwood Park have been improved over the year. Mulching and planting has helped consolidate these areas for easier long term maintenance with good turn ups to working bees (or what ever you want to call them). The Nature Reserve is also still being looked after (mainly due to Helen Tranter).

The talks have been excellent throughout the year and have been well attended. Our newsletter Eucryphia has been edited and produced, over the last 3 years, by Lyndon Stanley who has excelled in his skills (and his patience with us), producing a high quality newsletter (about 20 issues) helping communication between members of REPS and others. Lyndon and Maria also distribute the newsletter. On behalf of REPS I would like to thank you for your great contribution (including

working on the newsletter while you were busy working in Asia). Thanks from us all.

To the committee and all our members thank you for your support of this society.

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## **Bushcare Nature Conservation winner – Birds Australia Gluepot Reserve SA**

For the past nine years, the Gluepot Reserve's management committee has had a major challenge: an operating budget of less than \$50,000 a year, 54,000 hectares to manage and 18 nationally threatened species of birds to protect (not to mention reptiles and bats) in the South Australian Riverland region.



The reserve has just become the subject of a fifth doctoral study. Visitors are encouraged, where practical, to help the research and monitoring project.

It was bought in 1997 for \$360,000, which was raised over just 10 weeks from members

and supporters of Birds Australia. No government funding was involved, making it Australia's largest community owned and managed conservation reserve. It is run entirely by volunteers. In 2004 it was protected in perpetuity under SA law by signing of a SA Heritage Agreement, which made it the largest area of land in the State under such an agreement.

The reserve is the largest block of intact mallee left in Australia and had extraordinarily diverse vegetation communities. Parts of it have not been burnt since the last major fire in 1950 while other parts have escaped fire for even longer, so it contains a huge variety of habitats for birds and animals.

Many trees in the reserve's mallee and casuarina woodlands are hundreds of years old, providing essential old-growth habitat. In addition to the 18 species of threatened birds, there are 53 species of

reptiles and 12 species of bats, some nationally threatened. There are few areas in the world that support such a concentration of threatened species. The 14-person volunteer management committee is highly skilled in a huge range of resource management areas and business acumen needed to effectively run the reserve on a shoestring.

The committee has successfully combined land management, scientific research, environmental education and sustainable ecotourism to achieve biodiversity conservation.

When assessing how it performed in its 1999-2004 action plan, the committee found 90% of its 80 intended actions had been finished, or two-thirds completed. This is impressive, given some larger infrastructure tasks could only be carried out if funds were raised.

Volunteers are the lifeblood of the reserve and come from all States of Australia as well as overseas. In the first six years of operation, volunteers donated more than 140,000 hours and more than 900,000 kilometres of mileage, which the committee has valued at more than \$2.5 million.

The reserve is staffed on a continuous basis by volunteer rangers and assistant rangers. It has developed as a centre for scientific research, with 11 Australian universities and research institutions running ongoing projects on-site.

## **Can we save our small birds?**

**Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> November, 7:30pm  
CWA Hall Moss Vale – entry with  
gold coin donation**

All of us have delighted at the sound and sight of the beautiful small birds the Fairy Wrens, the Thornbills, and the Golden Whistlers that grace our gardens. Or used to, because many of these birds are disappearing. Australia could lose half its small bird species by the end of 2006.

A big reason for this loss is a native Australian honeyeater, the Noisy Miner. Noisy Miners are spreading into corridors, small bushland remnants, and suburban gardens; and are chasing away or killing any small bird that previously occupied them. Instead of helping small birds, some revegetation projects might actually be harming them, by helping the spread of Noisy Miners.

What should we plant in our gardens to help small birds and hinder the domination of Noisy Miners? Richard Hastings examined this question in a four-year Master of Science research project, and this talk presents the results of his research. He is revegetating his Canyonleigh property and looking forward to the day he sees his first small bird on his property.
